

First Queers Day is Feast's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queer Arts & Cultural Program. Everyone is invited to attend and enjoy First Queers Day, which is a one day celebration of Indigenous GLBTIQ pride through music, cabaret, food, fashion and kulcha.

Feast your knowledge and tastebuds with Hungry Mob Cooking Demonstrations by distinguished Indigenous people who will share their tucker stories and invite you to devour their delicious creations. Feast your fangs with our Hungry Mob Pig-Out - a free pig on a spit lunch. Yum.

The gorgeous sistas Shakaya will perform some of their huge pop hits, including Stop Calling Me and Cinderella from their debut album Shakaya, along with brand new songs from their second album. Shakaya exploded into the Australian pop charts in 2002 with Stop Calling Me, followed by the hit singles Sublime, Cinderella, The Way You Make Me

Feel and their self-titled album. For their second album Shakaya have been in the US travelling to Atlanta, Orlando, New York, LA & San Francisco where they wrote with very successful notable writers who have written smash hits for artists such as Justin Timberlake, Whitney Houston, TLC, Beyonce, Kelly Rowland, Kelly Clarkson & Anastacia.

David Page will perform a concert version of his autobiographical one-person show Page 8. David Page is best known as one of the Page family's extraordinary sons - composer, actor, drag artiste and a senior collaborator with Bangarra Dance Theatre. Little Davy Page was an all-singing, all-dancing sensation; at the tender age of 13 he appeared on Countdown and The Paul Hogan Show and in 1975 he became the only Australian artist to be signed to the Atlantic record label. David Page is outrageous, cheeky and a wellspring of beautiful energy. Directed by David's brother and artistic angel Stephen Page.

Direct from Magnetic Island singer songwriter Elena Higgins has a unique quitar technique as she plays a right handed strung guitar, left handed, which blends beautifully with her strong voice. Elena will perform songs from her delicious debut album Rivers of the Soul.

Red Hot Rythym + Braun is no stranger to Feast and the Australian cabaret circuit. For First Queers Day Red Hot Rhythm + Braun will perform songs from his 2002 Cabaret Festival performance, That Old Black Magic as well as other material from his forthcoming EP.

South Australia's Sista Funk will you get you movin' n' groovin' to their reggae, blues and rock 'n' roll melodies.

Inform your brain and shop a lot at the Blak Market, check out community information and stalls of craft, tucker and nik naks.

Days away

Kangaroo Island is simply one of the world's most exciting wilderness experiences for unspoilt nature, seals and Remarkable Rocks. The Flinders Ranges, the ancient rugged landscapes at the edge of the outback, is an experience not to be forgotten. Equally the Coorong National Park, with its fragile beauty and thousands of Pelicans and other bird life. A short trip away is Robe (for lobster) and the Coonawarra wine district.

The Adelaide Hills

The Hills are Adelaide's instant escape because they're less than a half-hour drive from the city centre! Suddenly, it seems, you are driving through pretty countryside with hillsides draped in vines and orchards and passing through a string of villages, many with galleries, pubs, restaurants and cafés. Walking trails, gardens, national parks and the chance to appreciate the seasons as they unfold are just some of the gifts on offer to any visitor here.

Restaurants

Adelaide is renowned for innovative cooking, great chefs and even greater wines. The main dining strips are Rundle Street (east), Gouger and Hutt Street in the CBD, O'Connell and Melbourne Streets in North Adelaide, and Unley and King William Roads, just out of the City. The Parade at Norwood is also a great place to eat.

Shopping



The Adelaide Zoo is also surprisingly close, just five minutes from North Terrace, and the River Torrens is an outstanding place for a daytime stroll. Tandanya Gallery on Grenfell St is also a must see.
